Montreal, August 21, 2015 – Beginning in September 2015, a whole host of exhibitions and activities will await McCord Museum visitors. Starting September 10, Le Mois de la Photo à Montréal will present, in partnership with the Museum, **AFTER FACEBOOK: IN LOVING MEMORY <3**, an exhibition that examines the question of posthumous identity on Facebook. The public is also invited to view works by Italian-born Montrealer and internationally-renowned graphic artist Vittorio Fiorucci at **Montreal through the Eyes of Vittorio: 50 Years of City Life and Graphic Design**, which opens on September 25. And for the 10th consecutive year, McGill College Avenue has once again become an extension of the Museum and until October 18 features the outdoor exhibition **David W. Marvin: Street Chronicles 1965-1975**, with 24 oversized photos illustrating the decade from 1965 to 1975.

November heralds in the Museum's 6th annual toy exhibition, a Holiday tradition in itself! This year, **Mister Rabbit's Circus** invites children to help this engaging, long-eared character search for circus props that have been spirited away by one or more mysterious thieves. In February 2016, the McCord **Artist-in-Residence** series welcomes **Nadia Myre**, who will find inspiration among the Museum's collections to create a new contemporary installation. Finally, May 27, 2016, marks the opening of **Italian Style: Fashion since 1945**, an international exhibition featuring the creations of some of the world's foremost designers.

The 2015-2016 cultural program also promises numerous activities offered in conjunction with the McCord Museum's temporary and permanent exhibitions. Notable among them is the return of **McCord After Hours**, a popular evening program that heads into its second year with a brand new approach, and **City Talks**, a series of lectures bringing together Montreal thinkers and builders. And the public will not want to miss the new chamber music series, **Schulich@McCord**, which showcases some of the most talented chamber music students from the Schulich School. Also back this fall are the many exceptional family activities offered by the Museum. A calendar and complete description of activities can be found in the appendix to this document. NEW EXHIBITIONS

AFTER FACEBOOK: IN LOVING MEMORY <3

September 10, 2015 to January 10, 2016

Presented in conjunction with the 14th annual edition of Le Mois de la Photo à Montréal – *The Post-Photographic Condition*

In partnership with the McCord Museum, Le Mois de la Photo à Montréal presents *AFTER FACEBOOK: IN LOVING MEMORY <3*. The exhibition explores the continuity of life after death on Facebook. It focuses on the economic, political and social issues associated with sharing images on the site as well as the paradigm shift in contemporary photography with the rise of social media. Admission to the exhibition is free during Le Mois de la Photo à Montréal, September 10 to October 11, 2015.

Montreal through the Eyes of Vittorio: 50 Years of City Life and Graphic Design

September 25, 2015 to April 10, 2016

The public is invited to discover works by graphic designer Vittorio Fiorucci, an Italian immigrant and internationally acclaimed poster artist who called Montreal home. Vittorio Fiorucci helped brand the landscape of Montreal for generations, bear witness to almost a half century of life in his adopted city. Vittorio's highly distinguishable art is defined by his simple shapes, vibrant colours, enigmatic characters and playfulness. More than 125 posters, photos, illustrations and comic strips take visitors on a journey through the cultural and social milestones of our city from the 1960s to the end of the 20th century.

Mister Rabbit's Circus

November 1, 2015 to April 17, 2016

Winter tradition is alive and well at the McCord Museum as it prepares for its 6th annual exhibition of toys, designed for children ages 3 to 9. This year, the Museum is partnering with les éditions Les 400 coups – on the occasion of the publishing house's 20th anniversary – and with the popular *Monsieur Lapin* series of books by author Pascal Héroult and illustrator Geneviève Després. Mister Rabbit invites all of his friends to attend a circus performance, but on the evening of the big premiere some of the circus props are missing and must be found in time for the show! Mister Rabbit leads an investigation to unmask the culprits. Why and how did the items disappear? During their exhaustive search, children will delight in discovering some 200 toys and other objects from the Museum's collections.

Nadia Myre, Artist-in-Residence

February 4 to May 29, 2016

Algonquin multidisciplinary artist Nadia Myre explores the subject of water through objects in the Museum's various collections as part of the Artist-in-Residence program. She also opens the door to her sources of inspiration.

Italian Style: Fashion since 1945

May 27 to September 25, 2016

This impressive exhibition, designed and produced by the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, presents the work of the most celebrated Italian designers,

particularly following World War II. In addition to viewing numerous dresses and creations by Valentino, Armani, Fendi, Prada, Dolce & Gabbana and Emilio Pucci, to name just a few, the public will discover pieces by new and emerging designers as well as a range of accessories, photographs, magazines, drawings and film clips: all witnesses to the glamour and influence of Italian fashion from 1945 to today.

CURRENT TEMPORARY EXHIBITIONS

David W. Marvin: Street Chronicles 1965-1975

**An outdoor exhibition by the McCord Museum on McGill College Avenue
Until October 18, 2015**

Following Montreal in the 1860s as seen through the lens of Alexander Henderson and the city circa 1930 by Harry Sutcliffe, this year's exhibition focuses on David W. Marvin (1930-1975) and his shots of the decade between 1965 and 1975, while Montreal was undergoing a major transformation in terms of both architecture and urban planning. This 10th edition of the Museum's outdoor display on McGill College Avenue brings together 24 oversized photographs by Marvin. In fact, this is the first major exhibition of the photographer, whose archives of some 6,000 35 mm negatives and prints were donated to the McCord Museum in 1978.

PERMANENT EXHIBITIONS

Montreal – Points of View

The exhibition explores 10 different facets of the history of Montreal, from its earliest residents to the city of today with its metro and skyscrapers. Through objects that bear witness to our past, visitors discover iconic districts pivotal moments in Montreal's history and the people who marked the city's development. The Museum also takes a fresh look at the city in its display of *Welcome to the Studio: An Allegory for Artistic Reflection and Transformation*, a work by contemporary artist Kent Monkman. The project was created with financial support from the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications du Québec.

Wearing our Identity – The First Peoples Collection

This permanent exhibition enables the public to explore the heritage of the First Peoples of Canada and learn more about how their dress has helped define their rich cultures and identities. It also allows visitors to better understand the importance of clothing in the development, preservation and communication of the social, cultural, political and spiritual identities of the First Nations, Inuit and Métis. Each season, works by contemporary artists are added to the exhibition, drawing visitors back often, with almost 85% of the objects being changed regularly. Works by artist Rebecca Belmore can be seen until January 2016. Restoration of the artefacts presented in the exhibition has been made possible through the generosity of The Molson Foundation. The Museum also wishes to thank the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications du Québec for its financial support of this initiative.
