EXPO 67 THE PLACE TO BE

A NEW McCORD MUSEUM EXHIBITION ON MCGILL COLLEGE AVENUE,

Montreal, June 1, 2017 – Until October 29, 2017 (a date not chosen at random), Montrealers and visitors will be able to revisit the festive atmosphere of the Expo 67 site through 24 photographs taken by photographer and documentary filmmaker Jean-Louis Frund. Montreal's Universal and International Exhibition, which ran from April 27 to October 29, 1967, was a unique event in the history of Canada and remains an unforgettable memory for those who saw it. Over these six months, millions shared the heady experience of "Man and His World." People from across the planet flocked to Montreal, and in opening its arms to them, the city – along with Quebec and Canada – redefined its identity. Jean-Louis Frund's photographs capture the spectacular architecture of the various pavilions and conjure the excitement of this magical place, whose islands were summoned out the St. Lawrence for the occasion by the project's engineers.

The exhibition is part of the official program for the 375th anniversary of Montreal.

"This photo report by Jean-Louis Frund reflects an exceptional period. Throughout the summer's celebration of our city, our outdoor exhibition in downtown Montreal will bring back a rush of memories for some and be a fascinating discovery for others," says Suzanne Sauvage, President and Chief Executive Officer of the McCord Museum.

Jean-Louis Frund, born in Quebec's Lac-Saint-Jean region, is an internationally recognized documentary filmmaker. He was commissioned by *Maclean's* magazine to photograph the Expo site, starting before construction was complete and continuing into the summer. The slides he made, reproduced here, are now part of the photography collection of the McCord Museum.


About the McCord Museum
